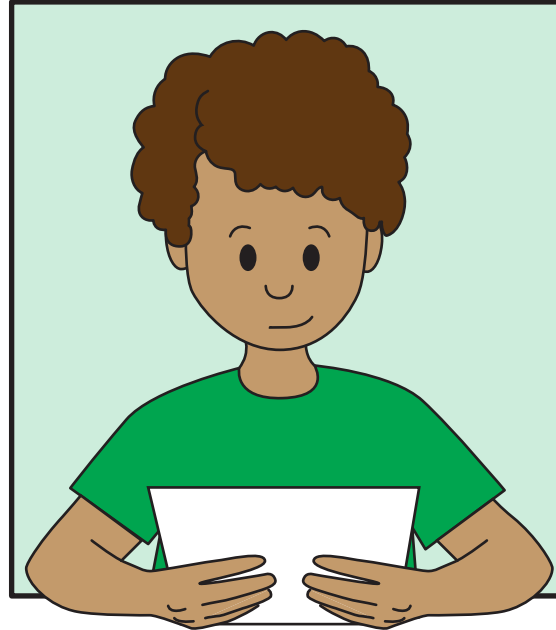

Hi, I'm Lee. I'm at Riley Hospital. My friends and I will tell you all about the Indiana Biobank and how it works.

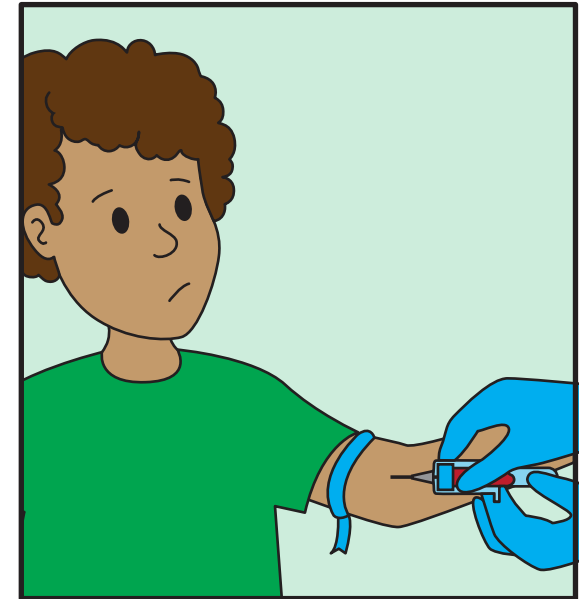


The Indiana Biobank keeps samples people give of blood, pee, and other things plus health information from their doctors. Researchers use the samples and information to learn more about health and sickness. You can give samples if you want. But you don't have to. This paper will help you decide.



I'll take you through how it works. First, I read about the Indiana Biobank (like you are right now). Then I choose to be in the Indiana Biobank or to not be in the Indiana Biobank. I want to be in the Indiana Biobank because I can help other kids.

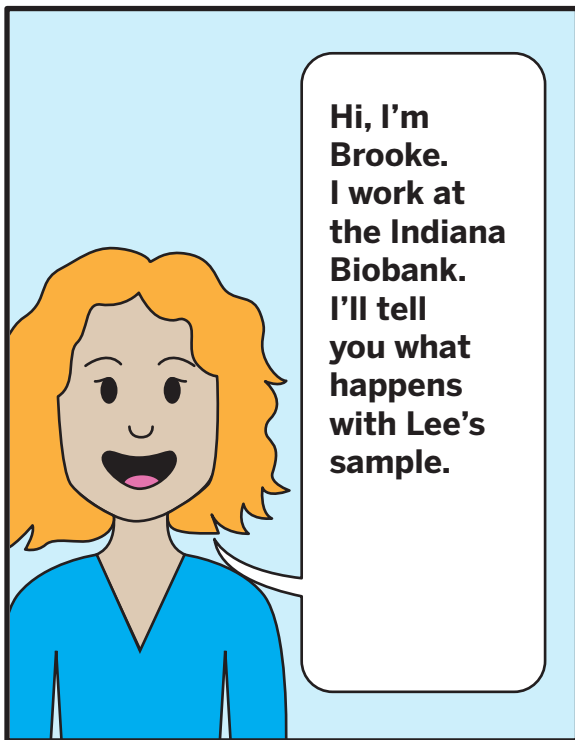
You can change your mind at any time. Just let us know. No one will be mad at all. Your doctor will treat you the same no matter what you choose.



After I choose to be in the Indiana Biobank and sign the form, I give a sample. It could be blood or pee or spit. Or it could be a little extra of something my doctor is already taking out of my body. That's all I have to do. Now it's Brooke's turn.

A blood sample might cause pain or bleeding. Peeing in a cup might be a little awkward. Spitting a lot can make your mouth dry.

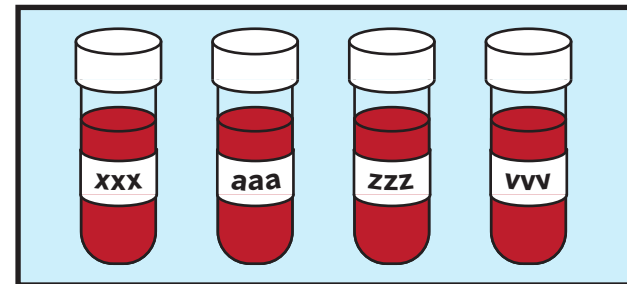




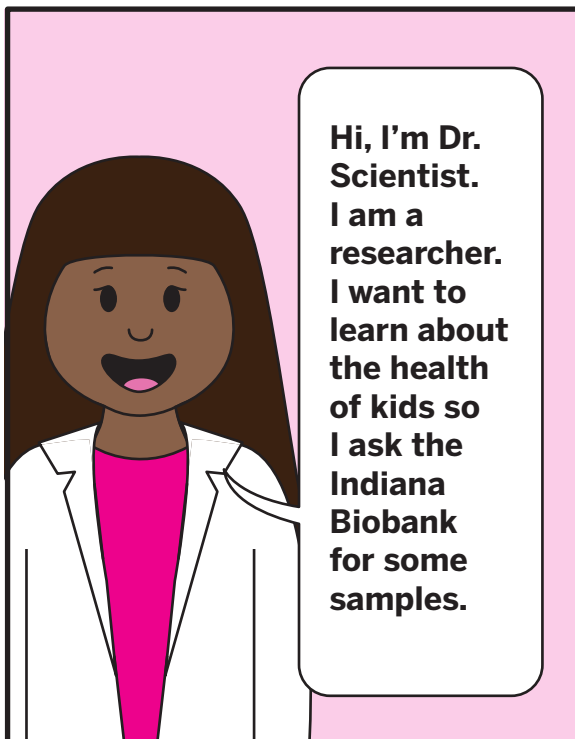
Hi, I'm Brooke. I work at the Indiana Biobank. I'll tell you what happens with Lee's sample.



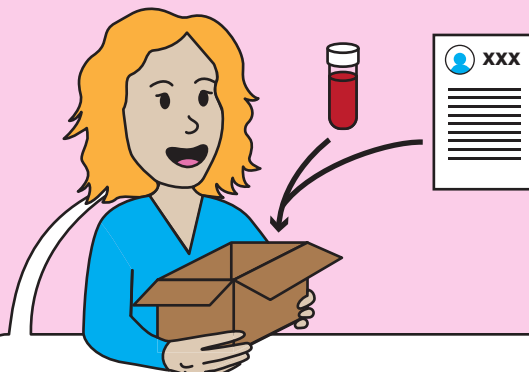
Lee's sample goes to the Indiana Biobank. It has a sticker on it with a secret code. The Indiana Biobank can look up the code to see Lee's medical record (that's all the things Lee's doctors save on the computer about his health). Only people who are allowed can see it.



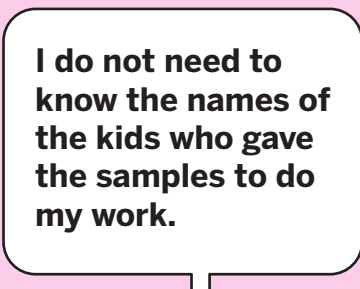
Lee's sample is locked up in a safe place. Only people who are allowed can see it. It is put with samples from other people until a researcher needs it.



Hi, I'm Dr. Scientist. I am a researcher. I want to learn about the health of kids so I ask the Indiana Biobank for some samples.



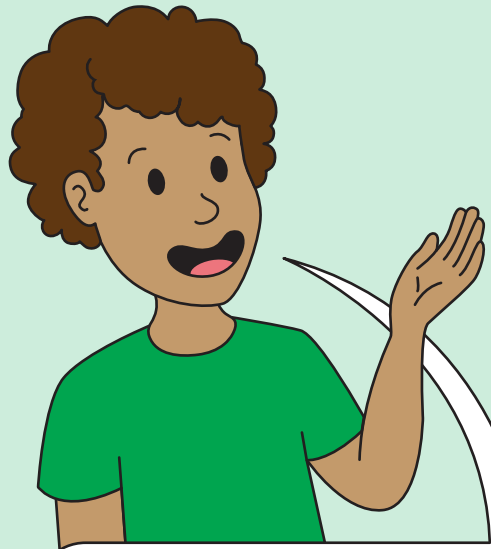
I make sure Dr. Scientist is allowed to get samples. Then I send her samples with health information. One of the samples is Lee's. It doesn't have his name on it and Dr. Scientist does not know what the secret codes mean. So she does not know the sample is from Lee.



I do not need to know the names of the kids who gave the samples to do my work.



I want to help kids be healthy. The samples can help me do that.



Remember, it's your choice. Here are some things you should know before you decide. If you want to be in the Indiana Biobank, fill out this page. If you don't want to be in the Indiana Biobank, that's okay. You don't need to do anything. Have a great day!

If I choose to be in the Indiana Biobank:

- I will give a sample. This may be blood, pee, spit, or a leftover piece of something already being taken from my body.
- Blood will be taken.
- For spit, I will spit in a special tube or a small sponge may be put in my mouth.
- For pee, I will go to a bathroom and pee in a special cup.
- Leftover pieces from surgeries are thrown away. Those are the pieces the Indiana Biobank would take.
- The Indiana Biobank will see what my doctors save about my health on the computer.
- My samples and health information without my name will be given to researchers outside of the Indiana Biobank.
- My name will not be shared with anyone outside the Indiana Biobank.
- The Indiana Biobank will keep my samples for a long time. They will be kept safe.
- I can change my mind and ask the Indiana Biobank to take my sample out of the Indiana Biobank.
- The Indiana Biobank might ask me if I want to be in other studies. I can always say no.
